Much has changed in Australian studio ceramics over the past few years and Lorraine Lee's work is evidence of some important developments currently taking place.

Using white porcelain clays and coloured slips in the process of coloured slip inlay, her work is an excellent example of two important strands in recent Australian ceramics; an interest in colour and the use of strong decorative motifs.

This exhibition explains her development since graduating from the Tasmanian School of Art eighteen months ago. As she has come to terms with a difficult medium, she has extended the decoration to a point where the familiar budgie has become much more than decoration. It is a progression from motif to symbol; from an interesting idea to subtle imagery.

The ceramics in this exhibition are all made from porcelain clays using both wheelthrown and hand building techniques. Two main decorative techniques have been used, those of 'brush painted pigments' and 'coloured slip inlay'.

Very few potters working in the field of contemporary ceramics in Australia make use of coloured slip inlay, due in the main, to its exacting and time consuming nature. Each colour is individually inlayed into the surface of the form, thus building up the image in much the same manner as block printing, and then trimmed back to form a smooth surface.

Initially, a great deal of experimentation is required to obtain a range of colours with a predictable response Variations in the firing atmosphere between reduction and oxidation further affect these colours.

The final result is a superbly finished image that gives the work a very unique character which can more than justify the hours spent on each piece.
