Sunday, July 5. After Morning
in a Family worship, Breakfast
Kent, and Dressing were over,
we had our usual Service by
Mr Watts, in the forenoon before
Dinner, and in the evening at
Ten O'Clock. The Text in the forenoon
was in Hebr. XII. "Looking unto
Jesus the Author and Finisher of our
Faith;" The Ground of the even-
ing's Discourse was taken in Heb.
Chap. XII. 14 — 24. The Text
was I come a Saviour.

Monday 6 July was a remarkable
day for the Arrival of Mr Wm Pitt
tornen from Dart Hill. He came by
Coach from Laurenceville; we had
just dined, and retired from Table
a few Minutes.

This day was also remarkable
for the discovery and celebra-
tion of the Lost Fork, i.e. the frag-
ment which had not been seen when found in
Mr. S. Cameron's Barn; It had been

Wed. 8 July
Mr WATTS left in for Robert
and did not return till
the 2^d day.

Thurs. 9 July
Mr Patterson and I then took a

Sunday July 12th
We had no Public Service, on
account of Mr WATTS' absence,
but Morning Prayer was read,

right Temple, by falling against a
one of the steps of the Stone
Stair. Luckily, Dr. Park was
present, and all was put right
in a short time.

Thursday, July 14.
The Bishop of Tasmania left
at 5 o'clock for England, in
the Urquiza, first for
Sydney.

Wednesday, July 15.
Mr W. Patterson and the two
boys, took a ride to Oatlands
on their own pleasure; and re-
turned in the dusk of the even-
ing.

Sunday, July 19
The Morning Prayers were read
as usual in Mr WATTS' absence, &
one of Mr. Chapman's Sermons;

leaved on board 1846 ring & been
in my family to assist. On Sunday
Mary Gattle, the female servant,
left the place, her service being
terminated, on account of her inten-
tion to be married in a day or two
afterwards, for which reason her
kind of path declined receiving her
back again.

Tues. July 21.

Mr and Mrs Patterson came down
to Bethwell close to their two
children.

Thurs. July 23rd

Mr. Watts returned before dinner,
and Mr. Williams arrived in
the evening to turn the mill
gate.

Friday, July 24

Mr Watts again called to

play about 1846. to the
Seymour, and the Williams
traced their way to the
town after having the
gate and reading for the
month or so doing, for some
months left in town when
he called at the house and
staid a night.

N.B. Mr. Price, the Police Ma-
gistrate at Helbert Town, sailed
for Norfolk Island, last Wednesday
evening, the 22^d July.

On Friday, the 24th Mr. and Mrs.
Patterson returned from their visit
to Bethwell, they arrived in the
evening, but left the children
behind them to my great regret.
Sunday, 26 July.

We had a Forenoon Service by
Mr. Watts, whose discourse was

"Send the Comforter, which is the
"Holy Ghost, whom the Father

No water went to Mount Seymour, after dinner.

I shall enter upon the 86th year of my age. Blessed be God, I lived at the night and the Day was less and not unusual; after dinner I received good wishes of my friends, and I left out from my grandchildren John & Galt since the 10th; we had no younger for any of our neighbors; so that it was just a family matter. I was in good health but suffering under several infirmities
