1851-

My dear Father

I have just time to mention that
Mr Farrell has engaged to take the bullock delivered
at Rosedale for £40 till 3 months I consider
him perfectly safe as he lost by ploughman
it was as well not to dine to have a bargain
with him, you will get a fine high price for
any fat sheep you might have to dispose
of 18s or 21s if very good the coarse sorted
dry Ewes often are in good condition about
this time, Farrells account is at Campbell Town
on the unfortunate business of Proj. Barnes
and I have given Farrell the order, to send to
his servant to receive the Bullocks from
you. The only further information I can give
you about wool is that it maintains its
price and Australian wools are very much
sought after. if you cannot sell advantageously,
you will always get a good market for
your Bix as A Lewis enquired of me if you
had any more to dispose of

your present balance is £ 35. 6. 7 it was £ 7
more but I had to give Miss J. D. Robinson
a check on your account for some blankets
& corduroy cloaths sent up to you.

I have sent a small parcel containing the
Swish Cambric & Jergen Jorgensen's work
along with a letter by a Mr. Williams
who is going to set up a Brewery at
Rop Bridge he is well acquainted with
Mr. Horne of Chiswick as he came out
with Tho. Horne, and has been Mr
Gatehouses managing partner the last
eighteen months. The parcel I meant to
have sent up by Mr. Popp but I happened
to lay too long in bed and was to take
foolish by one hour he had started
at 6 o'clock —

you no doubt will be pleased with John's
letters & miniature of himself I hope you
have got letters from England from Uncle
William as there have been so many
unwieldy letters - & I must conclude in
hushed with love to all
