Douce's Bank 21st December 1830

My dear Father

I received your welcome letter
on Sunday evening and was very sorry to learn that
my mother is plagued by her servants which seems
a very general complaint. I am half inclined to
prosecute her one as a w^est advised on Saturday
last with 210 male prisoners, she brought a
great number of letters from England and I hope
you will also receive some by the Post, there has been
a fresh Revolution in France and have deposed
the Bourbons and elected the prince of Orleans King
so we hear that the British now tired of war are
going to acknowledge him. Charles escaped to England
but there are a great many English still in
France who cannot obtain Passports to get away.
I had not bought a horse nor do I intend to keep one
I happened to meet Mr. Simpson when I was
exercising Mr Adey. mag. & having asked him
how he liked it. I said it was a new purchase—
This very weather must make you at present full
of business as we are here at present Mr Waller's is
still ill of a fever & we daily count some
person in this place now so near the balancing
Time, Mr Adey. was saying to day he wished
he had Mr Spain here & I think there would be
at present a very good opportunity for a
reconciliation you might mention it to him

to ask him how he would like it -

I have sent Mr. Fram's bill for acceptance and shall get it back to day you know Farrell & Sutton 2 of Pickers and Travers in the Bank for collection I have also to get the balance from Capt. Briggs which I shall do and place to your account in the Bank I cannot find your watch glass and as Mr. Clarke is walking St. Helier he will not be able to take up the Post - Mr. Graham left Hobart Town some time ago or I would have sent the wine and other things by him - We have a good deal of rain here at present and I hope you have the same at Roseau to refresh the Grass & crops in some districts I have heard that a great deal of the wheat is blighted -
