Bendigo Feb 13th 1851

Dear Father

I intend starting down from here tomorrow
for Melbourne - I have for the last few weeks
been trying to get in a few debts which were
 owing to me but without success & I really be-
 lieve that what they say is true & that
 the majority are really unable to make a living
 in consequence of the diggings being worked
 out - I would have wrote before but
 I felt I could not vent my ideas to
 write in ~~a~~ post particularly with such
 bad weather as we have had lately it
 is so depressing to suffer from cold &
 wet & expecting the winter to come down
 about your ears every moment I am
 glad to hear you enjoy such good
 health - I have been suffering much
 from cold lately for it is impossible

to get rid of it as long as the street
remains damp - but as the weather has
cleared up, or at least promises to do so
I hope to get rid of it on the road I
heard of Edward & his wife being in
Melbourne through a person who had
seen them. He said they were living
very gay & he believed he was not
going to return to Port Fairy but
to live somewhere in the neighbourhood
of Melbourne. I feel I shall be glad
to leave the Dwyers I never stayed on
from traps etc the time I was on
them - nor yet had a drink of pure
water except during the heavy rains
when the caught a cold just out
every summer it was positively brakish
to think it was so spoiled by

the Chinese - You may hope to see me
very shortly as I have packed up my
things - I had not many traps to sell &
as nearly every thing was destroyed when I was
flown out, and I could not afford to
replace them afterwards -

Hoping soon to see you & find you
all in good health
