I have not received letters  
from you for some time - Since  
you and dad here <sup>choke</sup> with the amount  
of snow & flood - A flock of  
1400 sheep & 300 lambs sold by auction  
like £1000. I have just received  
the last of my wool in the cartage  
off & have a very troublesome  
packing job - in consequence of being  
overhead down & men getting drunk  
the wool is falling in bales  
I am thinking of putting it home  
where for our own use the  
flock - the quality of it very bad

we are doing as well as most  
of the others. ~~and I hope we~~ now  
which we ought to have more time  
and a little land. I would think  
that stock must be low in ~~the~~  
our flock are doing remarkable well  
I have shipped them strongly  
we have not lost any yet by  
shipping. -

I have settled with the Sal job  
paid for the time I was in their service  
£40 - When you go to England  
I wish you would give us the value  
of stock & land with you, it will give  
us some idea how to act here - we have  
four Horses & eight blankets. Wish  
we had a small herd of cattle, so

gives us meat

The British goods we get here are  
of a very bad description such as  
books slops &c - Sections in many  
places are to be bought at poor  
~~but~~ ~~now~~ our men are rather  
troublesome in constantly changing  
place so as to bind them  
agreement.

Now the Town of Adelaide is  
coming to what I call ~~the~~ a great ful-  
ling off we hear the capital will come out  
after and our country is little but a  
few w<sup>o</sup> Egy report says his report  
continues bad - He used to hear the  
west our coast is very low and ready  
with the book of Home
