My Dear Father

As the Africaine sails to-morrow. I cannot give you any description of the country as yet having only been on shore a day and a half and been hitherto engaged landing the sheep - we had a long and stormy passage being eighteen days having lost 400 sheep out of 1000 - 86 were out of 17 = I made notes on the ship.

which I shall send you as soon  
as I have a little more leisure  
what I have seen of the country is Glen  
elg which is a fine flat country  
of a sandy ~~heavy~~<sup>loamy</sup> soil and Mt. Loft<sup>y</sup>  
at a distance of 6 miles opposite to ~~the~~  
a fine range of steep hills  
but of course being so short a time in  
the country I can judge but little  
I shall give you all particulars  
in a month or two -- I do not ~~feel~~  
that I gave you the particulars of  
my engagement with the South

Australian Company I get £100  
per annum with means to move or settle  
I have a house or two here  
There an agreement drawn out by Mr  
With whom signed by myself and Mr Giles  
being under the direction of Mr Samuel Steffens  
Colonial Manager for the S.A.C - it expressly  
states principal supervisor of her stock  
and also at an increase of salary. I have  
not soon M.B.G. yet I shall see him  
to-morrow his living at Adelaid 7 miles off  
you can tell whether I saw him today  
but had little to do with him <sup>for he is in business</sup> I am in  
good health and spirits hope my  
brother are all well & Prospered & flourish  
with my love to them our brother & sister
