My dear Clark

I ought to have sooner replied to your note of the 15th, but I have been for the last three weeks and still am engaged in hearing a very heavy case, which leaves me pretty well tired at the end of the day and almost incapable of writing legibly.

The point which you raise is a serious one. It had occurred to me before, and I was wondering how the difficulty would be got over -- whether by Commission from the Governor-General (which would be quite regular) or by one from the Queen superseding <u>Jure hec vice</u> the Governor-General under s.2.

I think that the matter ought to be brought under the notice of Lord Hopetoun when he arrives. I hope I shall see you in Sydney in January.
