John was quite well when I saw  
him in Portland and I should be  
well too but now he is thrown  
on his own resources in  
He has much business in Portland  
of the most kind and he has his things  
I have many flocks 20000 sheep  
loaded of Blacks. I provide them  
with skins and clothing

We find the the the hardy better  
then when men they are all under  
a good pack, while men who take  
charge of the stations - and who get to  
know how to do things - I do not  
know what we should do without  
them as they are rather troublesome  
sometimes with their ways.
