My dear Andrew,

Your last favor
duly received - I should
have answered it now,
but was ill with indisposition
(causing from a bad attack
of influenza) and a press
of office work at the close
of the half year, I have
had little time or inclination
to do anything.

I enclose the small sum
due to Robertson, and when

I called to pay it they could
not trace it on their books
& did not care to take
the money without discovering
the debt - Directly I find
the acc I will pay it.

This is the period of
the year when, perhaps, I
feel loneliest in Melbourne.
I think of the goodly gathering
which is to take place,
where I have been so
often privileged to be,
and this large city seems
very depopulated for me

I send you some lines
to be used in connection

with the tract of Australia.
They are imperfect and
crude, and written just on
the eve of writing this letter.
I send them now as a
token of what I would
do, and my undiminished
regard for the cause.
If you agree with me that
they are an imperfect offering
put them on one side;
but do not forget to convey
my congratulations to all
the brothers, and tell them
I shall be undoubtedly in the
spirit with them on Monday
night. In these sentiments
the other died, Walter, joins
with enthusiasm.

Give my warmest regards
to Mrs C. I am a long time
fulfilling my promise to
write her a letter - She will
not, I am sure, attribute
this to any forgetfulness
of her and her many
kindnesses - A few kisses
for the kindneses who I hope
are with Mrs C. quite well.
