My dear Andrew,

I have been delaying
an answer to your last
hoping that I might have
had something definite to
tell you as to my future
movements. Up to the present
however a good deal of
uncertainty attaches to my
plans. I have had several
offers of partnership since
I was admitted, one being

from Mr Watson with whom
I formerly was. Acting on
the advice of my friends & some
- what against my own
judgments I declined his
proposals, thinking that Mr
Smith wd. probably wish to
retain me - I have since
discussed the matter with
the latter & altho' he says
he is willing to increase
my salary & to make me
a "proposal" (as he terms it)
at the end of the year, wh.
he is going to England & will
be greatly inconvenienced
by my departure, he
will not make any
present change in our relations.

This does not suit me - I have had
Enough of clerkships & have a sufficiently
large connection to strike out for myself.

I have therefore given him notice & leave
at the end of the month. Meanwhile I am looking
out for offices & clients & will have greater difficulty
in getting the first than the second. Meanwhile I
want you to secure me off the Tasmanian
business you can - I think of sending a circular
letter to the members of the profession there or
putting an advertisement in the Hobart &
Launceston papers to the effect that I ~~have~~ ^{am engaged} ~~commence~~
~~business~~ Which course do you think the better?
I have also written to Dadds asking him to get
me appointed a Cons: of your Court. Will you
kindly see him on the subject & see that he
does not lose sight of my interests - I will also
try to get Commissions for all the other colonies
as I am more or less well known in them -
