Dear Andrew,

I have only time to write you a comparatively short letter, - like yourself I will go in for a long one in the holidays - By the way, I'd half a mind to commence this letter "Desir." Did you think I'd let 3 or 4 posts go by & not tell you if either my sister or the parcel was coming?

However, to business - You just got away in time to avoid being fried - the air is the thick of it now - As I wrote the thermometer in my room registers 88°, at the office it was 88° in the shade - and this is nothing to what's coming - I like this weather & I like to see this city in it. The heat seems to stimulate the people into activity & the approach of Xmas enlivens us greatly. The hot white streets are full of blinding light & a fine & hazy dust, but thank goodness there's not a breath of air.

I was afraid you would have a stormy & unpleasant passage, but you can afford to laugh at the remembrance of it now.

The little details of our lodgings may now keep some slight interest for you as you have mixed with the people & they are some they're something more to you than mere names. They all deserve to be remembered kindly - Mac's xxx got better but last night he told me it was recommencing. The other fellows are just the same

We have 2 arrivals since you left, - both Tasmania -
Collins (brother of Col. CLK at Richmond, Tas.)
& O'Connor. The latter is an old friend of
mine & decidedly above the others; - he has
at least culture to a certain extent.

"Pish!", you exclaim, "What about those
books?" Ah, yes, I remember - I have
 obeyed all your instructions literally - I called
 on Miss Green, with ma soeur, yesterday
 afternoon had an hours interview. I
 found her what I expected; - earnest, quiet,
 self-repressed even, & thoroughly kind -
 I am to see her again to-morrow, but after
 the steamer goes; to get from her the
 Hymn Book - which I will either send by
 post or by my sister who will arrive
 in Hobart Town by the trip of the "Geoff" after
 the one that brings you this. The Discussed
 Channing & Parker &c and she gave me
 an outline of "Tracts, outlines, essays
 "Sermons" &c all of which I will send
 by my sister - among them you will
 find one, Religion as affected by Modern Materialism, by the Revd
 J. Martinian, very interesting - The Theological
 Review (2 numbers of which she showed me)
 is an Unitarian production - It cannot be
 got in Melbourne - nor can the Studies of
 Christianity. (! engaged at Robertson to this effect)

I too have dropped into the old groove in
the way of life reading - I got thro'
the books & I returned you by dint of
reading at home & at the office - I have
made moderate progress with Whitman
(of whom more hereafter) & got half way
through Deco-workshop, which I like very
much & - prepare yourself for an oath-
ouida's eated - "lipa" which is not at all
bad, - in her peculiar style - I read it
because I saw in the papers a long
critique on it, wherein it was stated
that it contained some fine wood painting
& some Ruskin-like Sketches : - all this I
found to be true.

I hope you will be able to get thro'

the tender grace, the humorous, half-kind
half-serious, the unobtrusive scholarship,
that deep knowledge of human nature - and
naturalness - and the kind almost womanly
tenderness ~~that~~ which seem to me to breathe
this 'coy page' - the dear old Colonel, kind-
hearted Alice, charming Ethel - but why
particularise? The whole book ~~pours~~ to me
a deep underlying interest & many a pleasant
reminiscence.

I feel very dull after you left & was
perhaps a trifle sick - I have experienced
