My dear Andrew,

My last letter will have prepared you for the request I am about to make. My brother has left me without funds; the expenses of the winter have been more than usually heavy & I find myself very hard pushed & about £6 short.

Can you lend me that ^{by return} sum ^{until} the end of the month? Do not however think of doing so if it will cause you any inconvenience, as I daresay I could get it from some money-lender, but I wish to avoid the humiliation & expense of doing so, if possible.

I expect to be able to collect about £80 or £90 for my brother here shortly & then I daresay he will put me in funds.
