RESOURCES OF THE SEA SYMPOSIUM

Following from a suggestion of the former President of the Society, Sir Edric Bastyan, a symposium on the "Resources of the Sea" was held at Bicheno on the weekend of 2-4 November. The attendance was disappointing with a total of only 58 including the speakers.

The symposium was opened on Saturday afternoon by His Excellency the Governor of Tasmania, Sir Stanley Burbury, President of the Society. During the remainder of the afternoon the keynote address was given by Mr A. Dunbavin Butcher, followed by addresses on "The Physical Setting" by Dr D. Rochford, "The Scenic Margin" by Dr J.G. Mosley, "Minerals from the Oceans" by Dr P.J. Cook, and "Oil from the Sea Floor" by Mr B.M. Hopkins. On Saturday evening films were shown. The main theme on Sunday morning was the living resources of the sea, the addresses being "Fisheries Management" by Mr A.J. Harrison, "Farming the Sea" by Dr T. Dix, "Utilisation of the Resources of the Sea" by Mr S.J. Thrower and Mr D. James and "The Sea and its Resources as an Ecosystem" by Dr. A.J. Gilmour.

On Sunday afternoon an excursion was made along the coast between Bicheno and Piccaninny Point. On Monday, Maria Island was visited.

The proceedings of the symposium will be published in 1975.

The Council is grateful to the many people involved in the organisation and presentation of the symposium and in particular to Mr Banks, Chairman of the organising committee.

Despite some difficulties being experienced in the book-keeping resulting from staffing changes, the Society's finances are in a favourable condition, but with slightly lower cash balances for the year in the two main accounts. However, it does not seem necessary to alter either the subscription or budgets for the coming year because most of the difference is due to the carry over of payments from the previous year.

The special accounts are also in a satisfactory condition but of course our investments are not matching the current inflation despite the rise in interest rates on some of them.
