



Hythe Dec 21st 1874

My dear Aunt

I was in Town
yesterday & received your
dividends & enclose you a
cheque for the amount.
Fifteen Pounds. Kate seem-
ing well again. He is
quite well for several days
together but any extra excite-
ment or fatigue throws her
back a little temporarily.

She is improving in her
appetite ^{but} & wants change again
before she thoroughly settles
down again. I suppose
you will shortly be going
to Hobart Town to be present
at the gay doings there.
I see you are on the alert
at Green Ponds to receive the
Prince. There was a meeting
at Longford yesterday but I had
to go into Town but as the
time of the Prince's passing
through the place may be

uncertain I do not think we
shall do anything very grand.
I wrote you a letter some time
ago giving you a very
favorable account of Kate
but as she had a relapse
the following day I did not
send it. She is unsettled
& restless but will by degrees
take to her every day work.
In the mean time she enjoys
drawing about twisting.
My Father is very well & was
up at Melbourne to see the
grand designs there. My

Mother is also very well.

Maurice & Mary are expecting
an addition to their family
in March I hear or rather
a son & then as the saying
is. But I suppose I am
rather late in the day with
this piece of news. We saw
M^r Landan in town yesterday
looking out for a situation
We are thinking of asking
here for a few days. He
seem to have brushed up a
good deal since the war in
Hobart Town. Kind remembrance
