Respecting the Orders you sent to Mr. Cotton, I believe he has executed them, as nearly to your wishes as he could, and he has had from me, the whole of your Money laying in my hands, as a statement, which I expect he will transmit you, and of which you have a copy herewith. — Your House in Citchill Place, Mr.

Cotton will have informed you is let to Mrs. Towne
at 45 £. a Year Rent. She went to it in March last, I think
up to which time, it had stood Empty. Mr. Cotton has
paid me £.17.10 for 14 years Int. on the 350 £. Lent you
