Dear Sir

I have duly received your letter and the 5 packets for pickling wheat and am obliged to you for procuring them for me. I am now trying the virtue of it on a piece of land that I sowed with English barley last year and a portion of it was taken with blight. I am now sowing

You are kind enough to
offer to send for a Sewing Machine
for me, I am much obliged to
you for your kindness and I
shall be very glad of your help
in the matter, you say your
Machine was ^{about} £13 guineas in London,
I enclose a Circular (with your own)
which I got from Mr Gutton
Hobart town, do you think the

Machine I have, marked No 2
will be as good as the one you
have, he has that to supply for
£14 but I imagine no extras
although he does not say that,
if there are no extras that will be
rather too high for me, I should
not like to give more than £15
for a Machine ready for use —

I suppose you send the money
to England when you send for
the Machine, and then the
Freight & Commission would
that come to much?

I suppose the Machine I have

Marked No, is £17..10 not
£12/10 as I first read it

do you think it is worth while
inquiring about those in Mullbou

I do not know of any person
there that could inspect them,
