5th 22nd Oct^r of - E. Coleman calling upon Mr. M. with whom we had seen on our way past the Chain of Ponds. has^d spoken to him about his eternal interests & that it was my belief he was not in a right situation. the matter was canvassed at E. C. & the opinion was the more strengthened. this subject was again brought forward & he stated he had no friend in the Colony & that he believed to do something for his Brethren that at one time he was wandering about Adelaide & for 3 days nearly starved. he was reminded of the value of his soul & the necessity of saving it & that he should consider whether his present state was one favourable to his growth in Grace we left him considerably tendered altho' on our approaching the Public House inside the door of which he was stand^g with some other men as soon as he discovered us he got out of the way in a great fright & the man whom we asked for him said he was out but we were not to be put off & he came to us -
