My dear Sir

I am just informed that one of the Sealing men's Boats from the Sound is to proceed to Launceston in a few hours I beg leave to enclose you a communication from the Native relation to the Bible Society which has been forwarded by the Aborigines. I hope you will not decline the acceptance of their offer to you. I am the Treasurer here, and they intend applying to Capt. Moriarty to become one of their vice presidents.

The Committee and Secretary's have requested me to beg your advice whether they would request respectfully of his Excellency ^{two £1000} to become the Patron of their infant Society, and if it will meet your approbation.

It has not been communicated to either of the ~~Society's~~ ^{former or present} Superintendents that such a Society is in existence - the Aborigines did not wish it. I have already received about 18 in Skins and 10 in Cash as Subscriptions and I expect more very shortly

Shortly - I have not time to enter upon
the subject of the formation of this
Society - it is called the ^{Aborigines} ~~Aborigine~~ Bible
Society - auxiliary to the British and
Foreign Bible Society - The Committee
have also directed me to request of
you to make application in their
name to the ^{Local & other} Hobart Town Bible
Society to be permitted by the latter
to forward thro' them their com-
munications to the Parent Society
in London - their subscription list
and other documents, and that whatever
consignment of books may be forwarded
to the F. I. Society may be directed to
your care and through the Hobart B. S.
I am very much hurried at the present
moment and beg to apologise if there is
any thing obscure in this communication
The Society was commenced on the first day

of the present year, we hope soon to have
regular meetings, Several of the Native
aborigines are very desirous for a few mem-
bers of the abo- & ^L S. Magazin - could
you send them with the other book I
requested to W Scotts they ^{will} be packed
up with other articles for me - The
families of the Seafaring men are becoming
very interesting about 30 fine children, ^{my}
nearly half casts - are a hottentot female ^{one}
from Cape of good Hope besides this man
on the Islands - I cannot forward any
observations about the plan for the Governor
by this conveyance - we have no fresh water
yet nor do I think we ever will - the Aborigines
and the D'rt are not friends and the break is
widening - the great Deliverer in his merciful
providence is keeping us out of the melee. I feel
for my poor people they are treated as Slaves -
by the Divine blessing I hope to get liberty
to go to Hobart at the end of the year - May
I enquire of you if you remember any thing
about Money left by Mary Anne Arthur ^{the}

at his decease which Sirn't Darby received and while
and it was about the Time you were here. Poor
Walter & Mary are all making enquiry for it now
as it comes to her by right - May I have the favour
of a few lines from you if you can spare the
time my poor Abol rejoice when I tell them I have
