March 1849.

Wednesday 7th.

This is the anniversary of
Alice's birthday which I
remembered as usual.

Friday 9th.

Had a call in the mor-
-ning from Mr. Richard
Harrison.

Saturday 10th.

Mr. Doughty & Miss Watson
came before dinner; she
staid and dined while the
D^{rs} went to Spring Hill. They
took Sarah home with them
in the afternoon.

Sunday 11th.

Usual service in the morning
at home & at church in the
afternoon. Mr. Day's text was
from Matt 4th & 11th verse.

March 1849
Tuesday 13th

In the morning were all much surprised at finding our house dog Tiger dead by his kennel. On examination it was discovered that there was a bone in his throat.

Mrs H. walked over to Backs Farm, in the morning, & returned at an early hour in the evening.

Wednesday 14th

Mr. & Mrs Doughty, and Miss Watson & Isabel came in while we were at dinner on their way to Gorthy, but only staid a few minutes.

Thursday 15th

Miss & Mary Harrison walked

over in the afternoon, & Richard Harrison came while we were at tea. Richard left after supper & the others remained all night.

Thursday 16th

During the forenoon Mr. Learmonth, Miss Lempriere, & Master James Lempriere, came. After dinner, Mr. Learmonth, Miss Lempriere & Catharine went for a ride to Spring Hill. Miss Harrison & Mary went home in the afternoon & after tea Mr. Learmonth & the Lemprires returned to Pattans.

Saturday 17th

Had a drive in the carriage to Pattans, accompanied by Mrs. Hucksbeth, Clara &

March 1849 -
Catherine. Dined at Mr.
Doughty's & returned at
an early hour in the evening.

Sunday 18th
After the usual morning
service, & dinner the usual
party went to church.

Mr. Day's text was from
1st John III & IX. Nicodemus
answered & said, How can
these things be?

Tuesday 20th
This is the anniversary
of my brother Robert's birth-
day. Took an early dinner,
& went for a drive to the
Lovely Banks to call on
Mrs. Thorne. On our way
back, met Mr. Learmonth.

March 1849 -
who accompanied us home
took tea & then departed.

Thursday 22nd
Mr. & Miss Plot walked
over in the afternoon &
staid to tea. Mr. Richard
Harrison came in while
we were at tea & went
away after supper.

Friday 25th
Service as usual in the mor-
ning, & Mrs. H. Rosa & Lady
went to church in the after-
noon. Mr. Day's text was
taken from Mark VI. XI & XII.

Monday 26th
Mr. Learmonth came in
the morning. Dr. & Mrs. Doughty
called at the door, ^{in the afternoon} but Mrs. J.
did not come in, & presently

after Mr. & Miss Pike arrived.
I left immediately after tea.
Mr. Learmonth stays all night.

Tuesday 27th

This morning after breakfast
I had a slight attack of
my shivering, but it soon
went off. Mr. Learmonth
took his leave, about 12 o'clock.
Much disappointed that
my indisposition had pre-
vented him from having
the pleasure of giving me
a drive, as he had proposed.

Friday 30th

Mrs. Dry called in the after-
noon, but sat scarcely a
quarter of an hour.

March 1849—

Saturday 31st

After an early dinner, I
was treated with an airing
in the carriage, ultimately
to call at Bath Farm, but
we previously proceeded
nearly to Bath Inn. We
got home at tea-time

April 1849—

Sunday 1st

Mrs. H. & Eliza went to
Bathurst Church this fore-
noon, & came back to Win-
chester. In the afternoon Eliza
staid with me, while the
rest went to Fricke church.

April 1849

At Jericho Mr. Dyer's Sept
was taken from. Psalm XIX XIV

Monday 2nd

Mrs. Salmon called in the
forenoon with her baby.

Tuesday 3rd

Miss Pike arrived on
horseback about twelve
o'clock, & shortly after
Mr. Learmouth came in
having come down to
Jericho by the coach and
walked thence here. In
the afternoon Mr. Pike
went over, & he and his
daughter took their
leave after tea.

April 1849

Wednesday 4th

In the afternoon Richard
Harrison came over &
in the evening he and
Mr. Learmouth went away
Mr. L. intending to pro-
ceed to Catton's for
coach.

Friday 6th

This being Good Friday
we had service in the
morning at home, &
in the afternoon my
daughter, Cath. Rosa
& Leslie went to church.
Miss Sam's & Lucy Bag
came back with them

April 1859

but only staid a few minutes. Mr. Doughty & Miss Watson called on their way to Gorthy.

Saturday 7th

I had a slight attack of my complaint this evening.

Sunday 8th

Mrs. H. & Eliza went to Cattands in the morning to church, returned to dinner, & leaving Eliza with me, the rest went to Jericho in the afternoon. Mr. Day's text was from II Cor. V. 11

Mr. Salmon returned with them from church & came in for a few minutes to see me.

Monday 9th

Catharine walked over to Gorthy in the morning for a fall. Dr. & Mrs. Doughty called on their way to Gorthy, & Mr. Learmouth came in the afternoon.

Tuesday 10th

Mr. Learmouth set off on foot to Park Farm to join Mr. Grant & proceed in his gig to Cattands. Frances & Richard Harrison came & both Eliza for a ride to

April 1849

Shantworth; they returned to dinner & left us during the afternoon.

Wednesday 11th

Eliza & Catharine went over to Gorthy to spend the day, & returned in the evening.

Mrs. Pike, Caroline & Lizzy Lindley came in the afternoon & left us after tea.

Thursday 12th

Mrs. Roe with her baby, & Miss Watson walked over to dinner. Mrs. M.'s baby went away in the afternoon leaving Miss Watson to spend a few days with us.

April 1849 -

Saturday 14th

Mrs. & Mrs. Doughty came & spent the day with us.

Sunday 15th

Anniversary of my great-granddaughter Emily Patterson's birth-day, which I observed by drinking her health.

The day was observed in the usual manner & Mr. Dry's text was taken from James Ist - XV, XVI, XVII verses.

Monday 16th

Caroline Pike & Lizzy Lindley walked over in the morning & staid about half an hour. Mr. & Mrs. Dry took dinner with us & left a short time after.

April 1849—

Tuesday 17th

Miss Watson, Catharine & her Aunt went over to Gorthy after breakfast on business & returned immediately.

Miss Sams & Lucy Cooley called on their way to Gorthy in the morning & again on their return in the afternoon. Mr. Leamouth came in the forenoon.

Wednesday 18th

Mrs. H. Miss Watson & Cath. set off to Catlands in the carriage driven by Mr. Leamouth. Mr. Alfred Bissell, Mrs. Edw. Bissell, Mrs. Thorne & 2 children called in the morning.

April 1849

Mrs. H. returned in the evening with Mr. & Mrs. Mackersey whom she had met in Catlands. Lizzy had come with them, but she & Catharine had to attend an evening party at Mr. Hall's.

Thursday 19th

After an early dinner Mr. & Mrs. Mackersey set off for Hobart Town, & soon after they were gone Mr. Harrison called.

Friday 20th

Went for a drive to Catlands, accompanied by Mrs. H. & my daughter for the purpose of bring-

-ing back our beloved Lizzy & Catharine, the former of whom has been absent from us about 11 weeks. We dined at Mr. Wey's, & on our way back stopped at Mr. Doughty's door to pick up our two treasures & reached home in good time. Felt rather poorly in the evening with an attack of my complaint.

Saturday 21st

Mr. Learmonth came in the morning & in the afternoon he took Lizzy, Catharine for a drive to Park Farm.

April 1849

Sunday 22nd

Usual service in the morning which was read by Mr. Learmonth at Mrs H's request. In the afternoon the usual party attended church. Mr. Wey's text was taken from 1 Tim. 4 ch. 7th & 8th verses.

Monday 23rd

This morning Mr. Learmonth took a final adieu, having received orders to proceed as quickly as possible to Sydney, but he promised to pay us another visit if he could, on his return from Robert Town, whither his steps are now directed.

April 1849-

Tuesday 24th

M^r and M^{rs} Mackersay
retained from H. Town before
dinner.

Wednesday 25th

M^r & M^{rs} Mackersay re-
maind with us, & in the after-
noon paid a visit to Gothery
accompanied by M^{rs} Hudspeth.
Richard Harrison spent the
evening here.

Thursday 26th

Was the anniversary of the
premature death of my be-
loved son Thomas. M^r
& M^{rs} Mackersay left after
dinner for Rutley Barton
on their way to Greenhill.

April 1849-

Soon after M^r & Harrison called.
About nine P. M. M^r Leath-
worth arrived with two
nephews, having come by
coach from Hobash Town.

Friday 27th

M^r L still here. M^r
Little - Miss Caroline came
in the forenoon, & remained
till evening.

Saturday 28th

M^r Leathworth & M^{rs}
M^r & M^{rs} Leathworth were
highly out for an evening
before dinner.

Sunday 29th

In the forenoon M^r Leath-
worth read prayers and

A Letter from Mr. L. & in the
afternoon a portion of the
family attended Church.
Mr. Wigg's treat was in 11th
11, 11 & 12. Just before tea
Mr. Wigg called for a
few minutes.

Monday 30th

Mr. L. & his
two nephews took their de-
parture. The former found
Mr. L. & his family. The latter for
the sake of their parents
in Lancaster.

May 1849.

Tuesday 1st

Was busy this morning
arranging my acct. con-
-rent with Mrs. H., employ-
ing Leggy as my scribe.

Thursday 3rd

Richard Harrison called
in the morning to get
Mrs. H.'s signature to a
paper respecting the
proposed post messenger.

Friday 4th

Had a drive before
dinner to Mr. Coyle's.
Mrs. H., in the absence of

May

The servant, acting as charioteer. Miss Harrisson came just as we were setting out & left us before tea.

Saturday 8th

Had a drive towards the post office, in the forenoon.

Sunday 9th

This being the first Sunday of the month the usual party went to Outlands church to attend the communion. Miss Harrisson, escorted

May

by her brother, walked over to go up with them in the carriage. Richard left in the course of the morning. Our people returned to dinner & afterwards proceeded to Jericho Church. Mr Day's text in the morning was from Matt. 20 ch. 15 v. "Is thine eye evil, because I am good." & in the afternoon from 1 Tim. 1 ch. 15 v.

Tuesday 10th

Mrs Salmon called in the morning & sat a while. Mrs H. & C. & Co. drove up to Outlands,

& returned about 5 o'clock.
In the afternoon we had
Mr. Harrison & Mr. & Miss
Pike for a short time.

Wednesday 9th

This is the anniversary
of my son Robert's birth.
I was threatened with a
shivering this morning.

Thursday 10th

Had an attack of my
complaint early this morning,
which as usual made me
very weak for the rest of the
day. Mrs. H. & Lesley took
a walk to Park Farm &
returned to tea.

Friday 11th

Lizzy & Robert took a ride,

May 1849 -

to the Post Office in the
afternoon & were met on
their way by Richard &
Francis Harrison, who ac-
companied them back.

Richard went away in the
evening, & his sister stays
all night. Mrs. & Miss Pice
called in the afternoon.

Sunday 13th

Had the usual service
in the morning. In the
afternoon Miss Harrison
went to church with our
folk, & thence returned home.
While they were away Mr.
Doughty & Master Burgess
called.

May 1844

Monday 14th

Mrs. A. walked over to Hunt-
worth taking Prosa with
her. In the afternoon
the carriage was sent
to meet them.

Tuesday 15th

This morning Wm. Mrs. &
Miss Alicia Hall, Miss Pen-
cok & Mr. Bond came,
staid to dinner, & left
in the afternoon. I was
very poorly all day.

Wednesday 16th

Mr. & Mrs. Dru came early.
Mr. D. went on to Spring
Hill, & came back to dinner.
They left soon after.

May 1844 -

Thursday 17th

Accession day. Indis-
posed this evening with
a threatened attack of
shivering.

Friday 18th

Lizzy & Catharine went
to Huntworth to celebrate
the anniversary of Lucy
Logg's birthday. Mr. Har-
rison called in the af-
ternoon.

Sunday 20th

Read the service in the
morning. The usual party
went to church in the af-
ternoon & brought home with
them Miss Mary Lyons &
Miss Isabel Doughty who

are to stay the week with
us. Mr. & Mrs. Douglass came
in the afternoon, bringing
with them the baby &
his nurse, who are also
to stay.

Tuesday 22nd

Collins came to look at the
lock of the door. I had a slight
attack of shivering at bed time.

Wednesday 23rd

The 50th anniversary of my
marriage. Collins came and
repaired the lock. I had to
flicked with a long sleep this
morning - did not rise till two
o'clock.

Thursday 24th

Anniversary of 4 birth days

May 1849

Day - The Success Mr. H. & Mrs.
Stuyvesant, & other members of
Schoonover's, the father of Henry,
all of which I have been ac-
customed to class together, &
which were very comfortable
at dinner.

Friday 25th

This being Pentecost the
Communion was celebrated at
Barnard's, which our three
sisters attended as usual.

We left at 10 o'clock for
14 & 15 - The rest of the family
left, excepted, attended church
in the afternoon - the
text was from Ephs. IV, 4.

There is one spirit.

Saturday 26th

Mr. H. and Isabella, father
and mother & returned to
dinner - about three o'clock.

May 1849 -

And Mr. Doughty arrived from
London, since they had been at-
tending the birth day ball.
After dinner here they went
on to Putnam's taking Gubell
with them -

Tuesday 29th

I had a slight fit of shivering
early this morning - In the
forenoon Miss Saml and
Lucy Boyle called over to
spend the day & night with us.
Towards evening Mr. Harrison
called -

Wednesday 30th

Miss Saml & Mr. Keiser left
at noon after breakfast. Lizzy
& Catherine set out for a walk
to Mr. F. O'Connell, and then back
by three o'clock. Met by Mr. & Mrs.

Liza on their day here, so
they all came down together.
One visitor remained till
evening - Michael Harrison
called in the afternoon.

Thursday 31st

Lizzy & Catherine took a
ride to Putnam's accompanied
by Miss Fiske whom they called
for in going. - They got back
about dusk. During the day
Charles Boyle called with a
message. -

1849 June

Friday 1st.

Saturday 2^d.

I had a slight attack of
shivering early in the morning.
Edward Lindley came over
on errand. In the afternoon
Miss Garrison came over
in the evening & staid all
night.

Sunday 3^d.

Meeting service. Went at
home as usual. In the
afternoon, the families of A.
& F. Church, & Miss
Garrison returned home.
4th Anniversary of Mary
Jane Pitt's birth day.

June 1849

Monday 4th.

Anniversary of King George 3rd
& birthday as well as what
of my deceased daughter Alice.

Tuesday 5th.

Mr. Goodfellow indisposed
this morning from a bilious
affection. Richard Weston
came in after dinner & took
Mrs. Eliza & Catherine out
for a ride to Port Folio.
He remained to supper.

Wednesday 6th.

We had a call from Mr.
Garrison.

Friday 8th.

June 1849
Saturday 9th

The two boats having pulled
into the paddock. Their own
accord. Lizzie & her Aunt - went
-ed them - took a ride to
Montross.

Sunday 10th

I had a fit of shivering
this morning, which made
it probable that I should
keep my bed all day -
The service is usual, except
that Catherine staid at home
to assist her Aunt in taking care
of me. This is the 2^d anni-
versary of John C. W.'s birth day.

Monday 11th

In the forenoon Mrs G.
went to Goring - after dinner

June 1849 -

Mrs - Mrs W. called & sat
an hour. - Mr. W. accompanied
Mrs G. back from Goring about
sund. & sat some time with us.
Tuesday 12th

Mrs G. Elizabeth & Catherine
went in the carriage to Puttland
& back - Mr. Wilson called
afterwards Mr. Harrison -
The Ladies returned at 5 o'clock

Friday 15th

Frank arrived from college
for the winter vacation.

Saturday 16th

Mr. Doughty & Mr. Bogle
called together in the fore-
noon & sat half an hour.

Sunday 17th

Service at home as usual
& at Church in the afternoon.
Text - Luke 14th Ch. 13 v

June 1849
Monday 18th
Anniversary of the
Battle of Waterloo

Tuesday 19th
We had Richard Hays
in the Court -

Wednesday 21.
Shortest day - New Moon.
Stormy. Solstices in England.

Thursday 23 -
Had news from England
both good & bad.

Friday 24.
The services of the day
as usual. Frank's
cold kept him from
Church - Text. Luke 16-18

Saturday 25
Nil -

June 1849
Tuesday 26.

Had an attack of shivering
which made me keep my
bed till one o'clock -
Ed. Lindley came with a
message. In the afternoon
Mr. Geo. Patterson, his sister
& Miss Lewis arrived.

Wednesday 27.
The party above mentioned
with Eliza went to Lattin.
Mr. P. to attend the Sessions.
In the aft. - Miss Harrison
& Peter called - Our Ladies
& eldest returned home
at 6 P. M. -

Thursday 28.
Mr. Patterson left off earlier

thais moved to avoid
being fined from which
he narrowly escaped
yesterday. He got back
about 5 o'clock. The
business of the Sessions
being finished.

Friday 29.

Mr. P. accompanied two of
the ladies to Bathlands
this morn. I did not
feel quite so well. This
morn. better in the after-
noon. Mr. P. & the ladies got
home about 4 o'clock.

Sat. 30.

Our Bathwell visitors
took leave of us about

11.10.20
twelve o'clock. This day
the family received cards
announcing the Marriage
of John Mackenzie on
the 26th.

July Sunday 1
Monday the family very
seldom - Dinner at home
as usual. Bath & Fleck.
did not go to church on
acc. of their colds. Mr. Day's
last was Matt. 18. 20.

Mr. Dougherty called.

Mon. 2.

Had a call from Mr.
Harrison.

Tuesday 3.

Mrs. Miss Pike came
& dined. Mr. Harrison

July 1849
called in the after. I was
very poorly this morn.
Olyth bath. & Frank. saw
also Invalids - with very
bad colds. —

Wed. 4.
I was better this morn.
than the other Invalids
much the same.

Thursday 5.
Invalids much the
same to-day.

Friday 6.
I was pretty well this
morn. The other Inva-
lids not any better.

Mr. Harrison in the
after. Saturday 7.
Invalids the same.

July 1849
Sunday 8th
Invalids no better. No
Worship private or Public.
The roads preventing the pos-
sibility of any part of the
family attending church.

Monday 9th
Dr. Doughty called & pre-
scribed for the Invalids.
Mr. Harrison called at the
door.

Tuesday 10th
Dr. Doughty called to see
his patients. Peter Harrison
came in the afternoon &
staid the evening.

Wednesday 11th
Dr. Doughty called for the
same purpose as before.
We had Mr. John Wilson
in the afternoon.

July 1849 -
Thursday 12th

Mr. John Wilson. took tea
with us this evening.

Friday 13th

Mr. Doughty called to see
the imbalances, & pronounced
the malady to be, Stopping
Cough.

Saturday 14th
Nil.

Sunday 15th

Service at home as usual.
None could go to church
except Mr. H. & Coliza. Mr.
Dry preached to a very small
congregation. His text was
from 2^d Sam. 12th ch. 7th v.
"Show art the man."

July 1849 -
Monday 16th

Mr. Doughty called to see
his patients.

Tuesday 17th

Cather & Frank a little
better. Elizabeth much the
same. I myself had a slight
attack of shivering this
morning. & have been very
weak in consequence all
the day. Mr. & Miss Pike
called in the afternoon.

Wednesday 18th

Mr. Doughty called. Richard
Harrison came in the
afternoon.

Thursday 19th

Frank & Cather continue
to improve. Lizzy still
very poorly. Mr. Maasby
called in the morning.

July 1849—

to offer his services in
teaching the piano, & giving
lessons on the guitar, but
his offer was not accepted.

Friday 20th

Anniversary of Miss Chyde.
Patterson's birthday. The
Dr. called & found his patients
not so well as he expected. I
felt myself better to-day than
I have been for many weeks.
We were surprised this morning
by the arrival per coach of
the New Parrot which we sup-
posed to have been sent from
Sydney.

Saturday 21st

Had letter to-day from
Bro. Phillips & find that

July 1849—

Mr. Dr. sent the Parrot
for the amusement of the
young people.

Sunday 22nd

Service at home as usual.
Bro. H. Chyde & Bro. Dr. went
to church in the afternoon.
Bro. Dr.'s text was Phil. 1st 29
"to me to live is Christ
& to die is gain."

Monday 23rd

Bro. Doughty called, found
Frank & Cath. improving.
Elizabeth much the same.

Tuesday 24th

James & Richd. Harrison
called this afternoon.

July 1849—

Thursday 26th

Frank & Lizzie considerably better. Lizzie also improving. The Drs called to see them.

Friday 27th

We had Mr. Harrison for a short time this afternoon.

Saturday 28th

Mrs. H. engaged a man named John Hendrick as cook, while Thomas is to take the place of groom & Charles the garden in room of John Mackenzie, who was dismissed on the 25th.

Sunday 29th

Usual services at home. In the afternoon, Mrs. H. Lizzie & Mary went to Church. Mr. Dry's text was

July 1849

Matth. 23rd. Beware of false prophets &c.

Tuesday 31st

Mrs & Mr. Dry called this afternoon.

August 1849—

Wednesday 1st

A budget of letters was received from the Moore school this morning. All friends well.

Thursday 2nd

Mr. Doughty called this morning & found his patients nearly convalescent. Miss Harrison came in

August 1891
The afternoon, but did
not stay long.

Friday 3^d

The family complete at
breakfast this morn. with
the exception of Leslie.

The Convalescents took a
drive in the carriage the
length of Spring Hill & feel
greatly invigorated by the
fresh air.

Saturday 4th

Mrs H. & daughters have an
airing in the carriage.

I took a few turns in
the verandah, but felt
very feeble. Miss Harrison
came in the afternoon
to remain all night.

August 1891

Sunday 5th

Twelfth Anniversary of
a family bereavement. Mrs
H. Eliza, & Miss Harrison
went to Catlands church in
the morning, & to Jericho
in the afternoon. Mr. Dry's
texts were, first, from
1 Kings 18th 21st, & second,
from 1 Cor. 10th 11.

Monday 6th

Miss Harrison came to
tea & staid the evening.

Tuesday 7th

Frank paid a visit to
Anstey Barton & returned

August 1849—
In the evening.

Thursday 9th
Frank took a ride to
Catlands.

Saturday 11th
No letters or papers to-day.
Mail supposed to have been
missent to Spring Bay.

Sunday 12th
Service at home as usual.
Mrs H. very poorly. None of
the family attended church.

Monday 13th
Charles Cogle called this
morning with a note.

August 1849—
Tuesday 14th
Mrs & Miss Pike came over
to dinner.

Wednesday 15th
Mr Doughty called this
morning. Frank took
a ride to Catlands. In
the evening a constable
came to get a copy of J.
MacKenzie's discharge, as
the man had been taken
up as a runaway.

Thursday 16th
Miss Harrison & Richd.
called this afternoon.

August 1849—

Friday 17th

This being the 58th
anniversary of my birth,
I received the usual con-
gratulations. This day
70 years I commenced
writing my Journal &c. &c.
Mr. Harrison called in
the afternoon.
