My dear Anna Maria

I did not like the day to close. the first in the new year without convincing thee that thou hast not been forgotten. I left Mt Barker about ten o'clock and met dear William & Lewis and Alfred - about half way we took Louisa with us. as the Whooping Cough has made its appearance in Lucy Coleman's family. I arrived at Wanstead duly, and found Ellen going on nicely with her sweet little baby - he is a pretty babe indeed; - it is said too pretty for a boy. At Wanstead I saw the whole group of our grand children resident there. they are a nice little flock. and how I wish thou couldst see here to sett them. They are quite at home with their grand papa. The weather has turned rather warm - but rain and cool winds. chilblains are enlarged. Since I was here, and is a comfortable place. Since I arrived, both Mary and William do not like the idea of my journey with her alone. and have suggested a plan for William to accompany me. It is very thoughtful and kind indeed. but I would not like to take William away from his home, unnecessarily, and perhaps at a costly sacrifice. On my way down Rachel Ann told me that at Mount Barker they did not feel comfortable with the except of my travelling or horseback one alone. So then said I have indeed cause for much thankfulness at the case thus shown - how it may issue is uncertain. I should be thankful to have a companion, but do not like to be preserved from self-sacrifice. I know (I can heartily say it) that my God is sufficient for all things - and within I deserve to put my whole trust. He is indeed a refuge in times of trouble.

I arrived here about 10. William drove me over from the Bremer yesterday, and with Coach this morning - On arrival his Joseph Barrett greeted me at the Coach side and accompanied me to George Phillips' carrying my Carpet Bag saying that he could not often get such a job - I have seen Hamel Septimus Hale at Maria Phillips - also - the wife and children of Mrs. May, recently arrived from Melbourne - They had just left the house. They have 6 children and have sold a little property they had in Melbourne, and consider loss of they can do something, having done but poorly at Melbourne. It is many many years since Thomas saw his father and many of his relatives.

I left Mary progressing nicely - having no trouble, but pursued her to day.

Sequoia is a fine gentle boy fond of drawing and Painting. Some of the Paintings seems to be laid on with taste and judgment for young a boy. Alfred is rather more active and a little inclined to mischief. perhaps. though not much so far above. Louisa is a fat little girl, and Adair. child baby - a stout boy with very white hair and light blue eyes - all seem very good tempers. and under Mary's tuition are

making fair progress in learning - Friends and relatives at Mt Barker all well except Lucy's children who are all suffering or on the way of getting chrohn's disease. Louisa does not seem to have carried it to the Bremer. We drove in one day to Shattockyza a nice little place having several good bridges to cross in the streets, and many places for worship. It rained nearly all the way from Mt Barker to Town - but not very heavily. It is a hilly road with hills and ridges - which progresses slowly at Mount Barker, as the wrecker has removed rock, as to prevent the use of the stripping machine. Fredk May ^{dropped} his horse, on piece of iron & bushes were exploded and fired off - and the horse now a progress of stripping. this appears set to last much longer at the Bremer.

Ballarat sheep are a drug here and in Victoria. J. Horrell has just had a lot from the Darling sold at about £5.7h to 5.10. They bear about 2 or 3000 sol each they wish to sell - but there are no buyers - and as yet. there is no boiling down establishment. - further is what they must resort to. I purpose to start tomorrow at 7.15 ^{to} Kyneton or by ladyway, thereby mail car to Gisborne and stay the night. - then proceed by mail to Melrose where the Wellington lives, and there proceed

as was very open.

William found no doubt that he could not possibly leave home, and I, thinking I presume felt ~~anxious~~ from accompanying me. He is rather nervous, and I expect that what I said to you and communicated by him to F.M. that I should be pleased with his company, if he felt himself drawn to work; that it would be comforting to you to have one who could understand my speeches, otherwise, as you said, I should be sorry that he should leave home. I imagine that this may have determined him. So I suppose that I shall go alone as Colton outward, which may be further best. I shall be preserved from leaving my fleshly ~~form~~ but of course Master sees me that I should have a companion, daddies health provisions.

I now feel more fully the force of the words of the Apostle - "we walk by faith, not by sight". Truly man is a walk of faith. I am yet not shown what is to be my work, but the assurance given me that I shall go "in the fulness of the blessing of the Gospel of Christ" - it is still a comfort to rest on, as well as the fresh flowers of a heavenly Father's love - How I shall get back to Adelphi does not yet appear and must be left. I am commanded like J. Warren's love to this, also for George and even Mr. Barker friend &c &c and to all the family - of course - my dearest wife & self etc.
