There are several places opposite the N. side of Stocker Plains that require a little fencing. The ford near Purvis Stone Flat has been fenced, and the ford also below "The Falls". There were 8 or 10 of John Field's cattle on the run - cows & yearlings. - I should think that the land available for pasture cannot exceed 1000 acres, out of about 1900, (1890 by my calculation, 1953 by Mr. J. W. Scott); so that the value would be 1000 acres at £2 an acre, £900 at say, £0/-, i.e. £2000 + £450 = £2450 = about ^{an average of} £1.5. per acre. Putting down the remaining 829 acres at £3.10 an acre, ^{with the included strip of Bayes's grant in Knight's Corner,} the whole grant would be worth (£829 x £3.10 = £2901.10.0 + £2450 = £5351.10.0). - Taking, however, 829 acres = £2901.10.0, & the remaining 731 acres at £2 an acre for 1000 acres, £731 acres at 10/- an acre = £2365.10..0, the total would be £5267. - It will be well to include the strip of Bayes's grant in the certificate of title for Knight's Corner, and to take the 829 acres in another certificate. Directed Chellis & his mate to make a bridle-road round the hill at the Falls into the W. part of Knight's Corner. Saw Mr. Rostie, and arranged that his lease & right of purchase shall remain till May, 1st 1864, whether I occupy part of the block of 380 acres or not. If I occupy it he will, of course pay less rent. He wants about ~~half the~~ 130 or 140 acres only. - Tried the sewing machine again unsuccessfully. - Fair, frost. - Sept. 27th. - Searched carefully at the sluice gate near the corner
